**Biographical Note:** Dr. Augustus McCravey was born in northern Georgia. His undergraduate education was at the University of Georgia in Athens, and he later graduated from the Medical College of Georgia at Augusta in 1934. McCravey served his internship at the Erlanger Hospital in Chattanooga, Tennessee; and his neurosurgical residency under Dr. Temple Fay at Temple University Medical School in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Anticipating the outbreak of war, he joined the U.S. Army Medical Corps in January, 1941, as the first army neurosurgeon of the time. He served throughout World War II in charge of one of 17 U.S. Army neurosurgery centers. After the war McCravey returned to Tennessee as the first neurosurgeon in Chattanooga. Dr. Walter Boehm, Sr. later joined McCravey as his first partner. The group they founded continued under the name Neurosurgical Group of Chattanooga.

McCravey's entire professional career was spent at the Erlanger Medical Center, where he held a number of positions, including Chief of Staff. He was also active in teaching residents even after his retirement. McCravey was a founding member of the Southern Neurosurgical Society and served as its President in 1969. He was selected as one of the first Distinguished Practitioners in Neurosurgery by the

Society in 1981. McCravey is honored annually by the Augustus McCravey Resident Award Paper given at the annual meeting of the Southern Neurosurgical Society.

**Series/Scope and Content Notes:** This collection includes military and civilian records relating to Dr. Augustus McCravey and his work in neurosurgery. Five boxes of lantern slides document various patients and procedures. These slides were found mixed together and without any obvious order. Some of the titles on the boxes were illegible.
